Time to Reflect:

I love walking the lanes of Jersey, I always make a point of saying hello to everyone I pass by. But have you ever been walking in your own little world and someone says hello and you're like wait, who are you, I normally see you at the gym or somewhere else, I don't recognize you dressed like this or recognize you here?! Happens to me a lot.

I guess that's what was happening with the disciples on the walk to Emmaus as well. What they were seeing and witnessing didn't quite add up. And then Jesus talks about 'them' being witnesses. And there's something interesting going on in the grammar of what Jesus says to his disciples. He doesn't say, "you will be witnesses" or "please be witnesses," or "consider being witnesses if you have time." He uses the present tense, "you are witnesses of these things." We are witnesses.

As it turns out, witnessing is not voluntary, but a state of being.

A fascinating thing about being human is our brain. And even more fascinating, is our memory. We all remember things differently, and our memories are shaped by how we are interpreting the present.

I've seen a lot of encouragement for people to keep diaries during this pandemic, as diaries in the future will give future historians critical information about what everyday life was like during the lockdown. Living in Jersey, all Jersey Beans know about Nan Le Ruez's occupation diary which gives a fascinating account of life during the Nazi occupation here on the island.

We are witnessing the pandemic in our own context. We share our stories, concerns and joys with friends and neighbours alike. But if Jesus said "we are witnesses to these things" what does that mean for Christians living during the Pandemic?

What have we witnessed as Christians during this time? Where have we seen God? What is God doing in your life right now? What does the message of Easter mean in the middle of a Pandemic?

How are we witnessing the Good news of Jesus Christ in a world locked down, fearful and frightened? Perhaps this doesn't sound like Good news to you at all!

It's easy to deny our Christian identity, not share our story of hope and forgiveness to those who are broken, not have courage to say 'there is no fear in death because of Easter.' And the biggest hurdle; what's the point and why bother?

Well that's the thing. When something exciting happens in my life, I go round telling as many people as can, whether they want to hear it or not! What would Christianity and our church look like if we did that as well?

Because WE are witnesses. And it's not just about who we are, but how other people see God. They witness God through us. We see God, and because of our relationship with God, people see God through us. There's no getting away from it.

So what? What does this mean for me and you? Let's witness through this pandemic. I want to know, I want to see God in you. I want to hear your stories, I want to know what God is doing in your life. That they may hear the voices of all people who are struggling and that all people may be lifted up in the time of need.

May they see in us people who value others, people whom cherish moments with one another and that it is not about how much time we spend with them, or even if we are close to them physically, but that it is the quality of that experience that shows them how much they mean to us. We pray especially for those who are living alone, feeling separated from communities, from friends and from families. And we pray for those that are right now taking care of people and nursing others who may be quite ill and for all people who feel disconnected from the world.

God of Love we pray for those who are in pain, who feel alone, afraid, unwanted and unloved. For those who need your healing grace as they face great difficult and dark times in their lives. We pray for Our Nurses and Doctors, for all Carers in Residential Care Homes, Nursing Homes and also in Hospices and our Hospitals. For those who work tirelessly behind the scenes, keeping places clean, working in warehouse and on farms to bring us food, and those who are dealing with frantic people who are unable to stay calm. For those who work in our Food shops both with the public and in our warehouses that store the food, and we thank them so much for continuing to make sure there are food items on our shelves. That they are well stocked and we appreciate the work and the dedication it must take, in order to bring food to Islands that may be isolated, to large shops and small shops in our villages and small areas within this Island as well as on the mainland.

We pray for those who are abroad and unable to come home, who feel very disconnected from family and friends, isolated in cultures that they are not familiar with and who are afraid, wondering when they will be allowed to travel back home and if they will be safe when they do. We pray for those who have lost their jobs and those who do not have enough food to feed their families. Those that are struggling to meet their financial burdens during this time. For those who have life threatening illnesses who feel afraid and those who feel vulnerable and unsure of the future and are afraid to leave their homes and if it will be safe when they are allowed to come back out. And so we pray for those who are anxious and frightened about the coronavirus and wondering if they are safe where they are

We pray for those who do not have a home, forced to live on the streets, both adults and children and young people who are struggling on their own. For those who are forced to live with people who are abusive. For people crammed together in overcrowded migrant camps and for those who do not have proper healthcare or medical supplies and equipment. For those who are still facing war and violence in places wracked with unrest and for those completely alone and do not have a voice and even when they are calling out in pain and feel no one hears their plea. May we be beacons of hope for the voiceless

For anyone in our hearts today whom we know need healing and your love. We lift them silently up to you, now.

Loving and Gracious God, give all these people, all these places, all these situations strength and your bring comfort and healing and you bring peace and a sense of knowing they are being held by you.

Loving and merciful God, we pray for new beginnings, new ways of thinking and seeing, new challenges that enrich us and new opportunities to spread your love in a world that has been turned upside down and for the challenges we may face that they will enrich our lives rather than tear us apart.
