The States of Jersey has declared a climate emergency, and plans are underway to make Jersey carbon neutral by 2030 – twenty years earlier than the UK. It will mean huge changes, involve a lot of money, and touch on almost every aspect of island life. But how did we get here? Over the last 20 years, Jonathan has had a ring side seat on the climate change debate. As a TV producer in the BBC Science Unit, he was involved in almost every major BBC documentary about climate change, including 2019's "Climate Change: The Facts". He's met leading climate change sceptics, visited scientists studying climate change all over the world, and filmed climate change in action. In this talk, illustrated with clips from many different television programmes, he explains why climate change is such a difficult subject to film, identifies the key turning points in our understanding of the changing climate, and discusses how best to tackle climate change scepticism.

Jonathan Renouf is an award-winning television producer who spent 20 years working for BBC Television's Science Unit. He was Executive Producer of series such as "Wonders of the Universe", "The Sky at Night" and "How Earth Made Us". His climate change credits include: "Earth: The Climate Wars", "Meltdown: A Global Warming Journey" (BAFTA Nominated), "Climate Change by Numbers" and "Climate Change: The Facts". He now lives in Jersey.



Toilet Twinning

Pictures of toilets and balloons promoting toilet twinning are not usually seen outside St Aubin Methodist Church but, last Saturday, 4th September, they drew inquisitive islanders and visitors in to find out what was going on – doubtless also enticed by the promise of tea and cake!



Members of St Aubin were participating in the Kindness Festival. The area in front of St Aubin Parish Hall was buzzing with activity as 26 charities



explained their work with some selling various items to add to their funds. SAMC decided to open its doors and promote Toilet Twinning. By donating £60 to twin a toilet we could help fund a project in a poor community that will enable families to build a basic toilet, have access to clean water and learn about hygiene – a vital combination that saves lives. St Aubin has four loos on the premises and so needed to raise £240 to twin all four

toilets. By explaining the project and asking for donations for tea and cakes we ended up raising £242 – how amazing! A very enjoyable and worthwhile day for all our members who participated as it turned out to be a really sociable event - the first we have enjoyed since the easing of Covid restrictions. 
During the day we ran an explanatory video that can be found by scrolling down through the information on link Now, what next?!!

How To Pack A Shoebox

DECIDE on age group. Our age groups are: Child 3-6 or Child 6-11 or Young Person 12-16 or for Adults:; Man or Woman PURCHASE CONTENTS: Please refer to

our list of suggested contents opposite.
GET A SHOEBOX: max size shoe size 9 /

GET A SHOEBOX: max size shoe size 9 / 43 please

DECORATE the base and top separately (maybe with Christmas paper).

Arrange contents in shoebox.

<u>Inside the box on top of the contents</u> put
YOUR REPLY SLIP

Sort out your TRANSPORT DONATION either using BACS or included in an envelope with the reply slip on top of contents in box. .

Put LABEL on lid to indicate intended recipient. Labels should read 3-6 or 6-11 or 12-16 or Man or Woman

SECURE box with rubber band or string - this is really important - please do not seal.

DELIVER TO COLLECTION POINT - the Parish Halls & Les Quennevais Sports Centre However in view of the uncertainty at time of printing we advise that you check with your chosen collection place before delivery.

We trust there will be no lockdowns or delays, but if this does happen, Mustard Seed commits to getting the shoeboxes to those in need in Romania as quickly as it is safe and possible to do so.

Last year we sent 2905 Christmas shoeboxes from Jersey to Romania. How many will it be this year? The answer depends on you.

Closing Date October 27th

SUGGESTED CONTENTS

All items need to be as good as new, preferably new!
Children's boxes should be unisex - each box suitable for either gender.
All items of clothing should be appropriate size for age group. For everyone the suggested clothing would be hat, gloves, scarf or socks.

<u>Child 3-6:</u> 3 toys: including a soft toy & other items possibly car & ball. <u>Writing materials:</u> paper, pencil, wax crayons. <u>Toothbrush & Toothpaste.</u> <u>Clothing:</u> 2 items

<u>Child 6-11:</u> 2 Fun items: possibly ball, toy car, marbles. <u>Writing materials:</u> paper, pencils, rubber, sharpener, pens, crayons or felt pens. <u>Toothbrush & Toothpaste.</u> <u>Clothing</u>: 2 items.

Young person 12-16: Writing materials: paper, pens, pencils, rubber, sharpener, coloring pencils. Toiletries: Toothbrush & toothpaste or small toiletry items. 1 Useful item maybe mug (well protected) / torch, & if possible further item to bring enjoyment. Clothing: 2 items

Adult Boxes

3 items of non-perishable food (pasta, rice, tinned foods Use by date must be AFTER ULLY 2022). Toiletries 1 large toiletry item or 2 smaller items (liquids well sealed). At least 1 Useful item: (torch, mug, umbrella, string, scissors, small tool set, comb, pen, notebook etc) Clothing 2 or 3 items
